THE SOCIAL WHIRL

When the fencing is done and dusted, what people remember about world and European veterans' championships are the social events. Too often, those that burn themselves into the memory tend to be the disasters, like the freezing gala dinner under a tent next to an ear-splitting local disco in Weinfeld, Switzerland, or the cringe-making efforts by the master of ceremonies in Tampa 2002 to get each national group to sing something traditional – the sight and sound of the Brits piping up with *Ten Green Bottles* and a lone Frenchman finally being persuaded to give a rendition of *La Vie En Rose* will take a long time to heal.

But in Bath the NVA is determined to make the social events memorable for all the right reasons. Entertainments Manager Richard Bonehill has promised slickly professional half-hour opening and closing ceremonies involving audio-visual presentations and live entertainment. And a sumptuous gala dinner will be held in the magnificent Assembly Rooms, which were originally the focal point for the affluent Regency residents of Bath, followed by dancing until 1 am. Oh, and just remember, Jane, there is a restriction on noise of 95 db.

Masterminding the organisation of these events is Gillian Aghajan. To kick off, a Civic Reception will be held in the elegant Regency Pump Room at the Roman Baths on Thursday 31st August at 8 pm. Entry will include a glass of wine and nibbles. Transport will be provided from and back to the University. Official guides will be strategically placed around the Baths to answer questions on the history of the buildings, which include the stone remains of one of the finest religious spas in the ancient world. You can see the ruins of the temple of Minerva, goddess of the thermal spring, and visit the bathhouse that local residents and pilgrims used nearly 2000 years ago.

The Opening Ceremony will take place in the University's Sports Training Village at 3 pm on Friday 1st September in the finals hall and will include short speeches by the FIE and BFA Presidents. Seating is in banked tiers accommodating 480 people.

Each day meal and drink tickets will be issued to referees, staff and volunteers. On Saturday evening there will be a free hot buffet and disco for volunteer helpers.

The Closing Ceremony is on Sunday at 5:30 pm in the finals hall, following which the action moves back to the Assembly Rooms for the gala dinner hosted by Dave Sweeney and expected to be attended by 400 people. Transport will be provided from the University between 7 and 8 pm.

There will be an information centre at the venue with information and advice about nearby places to visit, such as a boat trip on the Kennet and Avon Canal to the village of Bathampton where there are fine riverside restaurants and a pub.

And if the championships leave fencers battered and bruised, the recently opened Thermae Spa Bath offers bathing in warm natural spring waters and state-of-the-art spa facilities designed to refresh the body and soothe the mind.

Most teams have fencers, usually a single official, the team manager, and a small number of partners.

CAN YOU HELP!!!!!! WINTON CUP

Dear Hilary

I was referred to Penny Spink by John Ramsey who I approached last year on this matter. In turn Penny referred me to Malcolm Fare as Archivist and also to your good self re The Veterans

Below I set out the story to date

U19s LONDON SCHOOLBOYS CUP - THE WINTON CUP
Have you any idea what happened to the cup - see title above.

BACKGROUND

I fenced from 1968 to 1976. My fencing teachers were Prof. Froeschlen, Madame Froeschlen and Derek Allen (foil and epee) and, for a short time, George Ganchev for sabre. I was never equal to the top standard but was a reasonable club standard fencer and fenced for both in their time the Froeschlen club and the Allen club including the Civil Service. For a couple of years I did arrange and organise the then annual London vs The Rest match at all four weapons - namely
Ladies foil
Men Foil
Men Epee
Men Sabre, and, in addition I organised The London League competition for a few years .

In 1973 and 1974 the Allen club took on board the organisation and running of the London Schoolboys Foil fencing competitions for the three age groups.

At that time whilst there were cups for the younger group winners there was no cup for the U19s age group and so I had a cup prepared by Fowlers and donated it for that purpose.

I named it after Bobbie Winton, with his agreement, in order that the particular age group of boys had a similar prize as the winner of the same age group of school girls who was awarded the Summerfield cup.

I did check with John Ramsay some little time ago as to whether or not the Winton Cup I had donated was the same Winton Cup now competed for.

He assured me that it was not.

Just as a matter of curiosity do you know what happened to that cup I had donated. It was quite a large cup bearing the obvious lettering

Who had donated it

The competition for which it was awarded to the winner. I do know that during the period I fenced many of the cups donated to the British Fencing Assn. then housed at the old De Beaumont Centre near Queens Club, were not strictly monitored and disappeared. This was generally because winners of the cups were often not diligent enough to return them to the old HQ building for the competition in the following year.

I have raised the matter with Malcolm Fare who also fenced for the civil Service during the same period as myself and I have provided him with the above details and some further informations which I hope will be of use.

Many thanks for such a prompt reply to my enquiry.

Unfortunately I gave up fencing in 1976 to concentrate more on my work. I am now 71 and retired.

However I remain mentally and physically active by being part and parcel of a group of retired civil servants under the canopy of The Civil Service Retirement Fellowship. I serve on the committee of the local group at Edgware and Stanmore and for my sins wear the cloak of Treasurer.

I am glad to hear that you are still actively participating in the sport. I must admit that when I decided to give it up it was with a great deal of regret but I had to think of

promotion and how that affects the pension etc. at the end of the working road.

ANYWAY TO MY ENQUIRY RE THE ABOVE CUP.

Unfortunately I was not involved in the organisation etc. of the competition after 1975 and so am unable to let you have a date about the last time that particular competition took place.

I can tell you that the Allen Club organised the competition and held it at the Parliament Hill School for Girls and after the competition in 1973 when there was no cup for the winner of the U19s school boys competition but the younger age group winners did receive cups I decided to donate a cup for the 1974 competition. So the first time the U19s London Schoolboys fencing competition winner received a cup was in 1974. I have no idea as to who that was although I used to attend in the organisation as a member of the Allen F C and assist in presiding during the competition.

The competition was generally organised to take place in mid January to mid February but generally took place about the end of January of the year in question.

That is about as much that I can recall.

Unfortunately ageing is a bit of a nuisance and the 1974 diary together with the receipt from Fowlers is tucked away safely to such a degree that I can't recall where I have put it. Most frustrating !!

Some body who might recall the last time the Allen F C organised the competition would be Derek Crawthorne because he was a leading light in the club at that time But generally I only raised the matter out of curiosity once I saw the Fowlers receipt.(If I recall correctly I think the charge for the cup was less than twenty pounds (£20), but that represented a greater value then than it does today.) My curiosity was aroused as to what might have happened to the cup after all these years.

I hope that it does reveal itself because it might have an interesting tale to reveal about the past years and holders. In fact I think a then very young Bruniges won the cup one year.

Hi Malcolm.

I have found my diary for 1974 and the Fowler's receipt. The receipt is dated 2nd Nov 1973 and the value of the cup at that time was £20.35 including the cost of engraving. The first time the cup was presented was the week end 26/27 January 1974.

The competition was the London Schoolboys Foil . Held, as I previously stated, at the Parliament Hill School for Girls N W London.

Is it possible that one of the previous winners of this cup and now possibly a veteran might have a memory of what happened to it??

Any thing you might be able to discover about the fate of the cup would be much appreciated.
