GB VETS SUCCESS IN EUROPEAN TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Once again, the NVA Great Britain Team kept British Fencing firmly on the map in the European Team Championships, held in Turku, Finland over the weekend of 25th-28th May this year.

The Championships were hotly contested by teams from Germany, Finland, Latvia, France, Russia, Italy, Norway, Netherlands, Hungary, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine, Spain, Belgium and of course, Great Britain.

Our hosts organised the competition most efficiently, and the venue was a large 4 star "Holiday Club" hotel just outside the city, with a spacious, modern sports arena, gymnasium, swimming pool and variety of restaurants (ever tried Reindeer Pizza? – honest).

Friday saw the first events of the competition with the Women's Foil and Men's Epee. Our team comprised Hilary Philbin, Sarah Kellett, Clare Halsted and Jane Clayton. The first match was against Hungary and turned out to be a close result with Hungary the victors by 5-4.

Our ladies took a resounding 7-2 win against Finland, but then lost to France in the 3rd round 7-2.

In the D E, we came up against a strong Russian team who took 5 victories to take them into the next round. Germany beat the Russians, (who finished third) and then went on to defeat the Italians to take the Gold.

Our Men's Epee team of Howard West, Neal Mallett, Gerry Simpson and Ralph Johnson, took a convincing victory of 9-0 from the Netherlands in the first round, and beat Germany 5-4 in the second. This match saw an unsuccessful Jury called after a winning hit at "time" by Ralph with a score of 0-0 (we had an excellent photo of what would have been Ralph's winning hit, but it was not admissible!)

Having been seeded first after the poules, they received a bye then came up against Sweden who took a 5-1 victory to dash British hopes. Germany went on to take the title with Italy second and Sweden third.

Women's Sabre and Men's Foil was next on Saturday, and the Men's Foil team of Brian Causton, Nick Stokes, Jim Philbin and Geoff Silverman lost to both France and Hungary 5-4 in the poules.

They had scored sufficiently to make the last eight and a tough match saw them go out 5-4 to Switzerland who, in turn were beaten out of third place by Russia. The final was between Hungary and Italy, and everyone for miles around heard Italy take the victory 5-2.

Our Women's Sabre team comprised Jane Hutchison, Sue Benney, Yvonne Walls and Lynne Bornemisza.

They were up against strong competition from Germany, Italy and Russia and a poule unique was undertaken.

Our ladies showed how they meant to continue by first defeating Italy 8-1, and then Russia 6-3.

Germany always looked strong and posed the biggest threat to the GB squad, having defeated both Italy and Russia 5-4.

With the match against Germany at 4 victories each, it was up to Sue Benney if we were to take the Gold. Her opponent's weapon had been showing a fault throughout the match but she had been allowed to continue by the referee. Sue scored a further hit, and her opponent appealed against it on the grounds of her

faulty weapon. A Jury was called by GB, but we unfortunately lost this.

A very fired up Sue, after waiting on the piste for some ten minutes, then stormed her opponent to swiftly take the next two hits – and Great Britain had taken the Gold. Well done ladies, you made us all feel very proud at that moment.

On the final day, the GB Women's Epee team of Jenny Morris, Janet Cooksey, Kate Smith and Kate Elvin won their first poule match against Netherlands 5-4, and lost 4-5 to Italy. They then met the eventual winners, Germany and put up an excellent performance, but went out of the competition 5-3.

Our Men's Sabre team were Jim Philbin, Mark Hall, Chris Prevett and Richard Bonehill. In the poule they showed their determination by beating France 5-4, then Finland 8-1.

They came up against Latvia in the last 8 D E and were the victors 5-1. A tough match against Russia in the semi-finals saw the squad lose 5-3, but they had performed well enough for a fight-off for the Bronze and beat Germany convincingly at 5-2 to take the medal for Great Britain.

All in all, a very successful and highly enjoyable competition for all who took part, and for the supporters who witnessed our success.

NVA Lottery 2006

The NVA Grand Summer Draw took place at the Novotel, Milton Keynes on Saturday 3rd June. There were 12 prizes in all drawn during the Age Group Qualifiers Competition Dinner.

BEHIND THE SCENES: Malcolm Fare

You know that when you see a swan gliding elegantly along, under the water its feet are paddling frantically. Well, in terms of the World Veterans Championships Dave Sweeney is the swan – difficult to imagine, I know – but the feet are John Mason. He is the specialist software designer who has put together a system that, in theory, ensures that everything runs smoothly.

He began with the FIE's Handbook of Specifications, which identifies the main meetings that need to be held in advance of the event, the closing date, opening and closing ceremonies, medical cover, refereeing standards, etc. The first document he produced was the Project Overview, which defines the people who will direct the projects, the stakeholders, fencers, coaches and organisers.

It describes the project in a series of dependency diagrams. These are pictures of things to do related by sequence; for example, a website has to be published before entries can be accepted; entries have to be accepted before the competition can start. It is a way of taking a lot of details and ordering them to make the project easier to understand. A total of 12 activities were identified that all come together to make the project.

Design Documents

Each activity spawned a design document. This contained a list of tasks, identified manager roles responsible for tasks and the budget allocated to the activity. When a design document is completed, everyone should have the confidence that the activity will be successful because it has been thought out in detail.

After John had created the first draft of each document, the other members of the Steering Group reviewed it. The cycle of change and review continued until everyone was satisfied that the document was complete, was accurate and that the process would work.

The design process was well advanced when two organisation charts were produced: one for the work to be done leading up to the event and the other for the organisation during the event. Then people were allocated to roles.

The last document to be produced was the floor plan. This defined what facilities at Bath University were going to be used and described their location. Piste layouts were defined, and the location of armourers, weapon control, registration and information areas.

Website

John was keen to have a website for the event that would be visually appealing, contain all the information that fencers and team managers would need and be in a number of languages. A lot of work went into its design and you can judge for yourselves how well he succeeded at www.veterans-fencing.co.uk/wc2006. The fencing photograph from Karina Hoskyns is the visual link between all the pages.

Once the English version was agreed by the Steering Group, Peter Baron provided translations into French, German, Spanish and Italian. Chris Green at Activ8 provided the web space.

On-Line Entry

Another major piece of work John committed himself to was the provision of on-line entry and making the Internet the only means of entering. There are advantages to this: team managers key in their own data so transcription errors are eliminated; last minute changes are no effort for the organiser as the team manager makes the changes.

But designing the software was a complex task. Not only are there fencers to register, but also referees, officials, coaches and partners. People can book dinner tickets and can request transport to and from airports; they can even book accommodation in the University. The next escalation was to offer the entry website also in five languages. The final piece in the jigsaw was to give the FIE and the BFA (as well as the organisers) access to the data over the Internet so that they can see who has entered.

The WC2006 project has been the equivalent of a full-time job and will continue to be right up to the championships. So next time you see Dave, think of John.

Your Chance to help: be trained as an Armourer.....

As part of the preparations for the World Championships in Bath the NVA are running courses for Armourers.

The following skills are addressed:

- a) Technical Skills – fault diagnosis and repair of a range of equipment
- b) Management Skills – weapon control processes and control.

It is proposed to identify a group of Candidate Armourers.

Candidate Armourers will be people new to armory but who have an interest in fencing. They are often parents of young fencers or are fencers who are ready to give up the competition circuit but who wish to stay in the sport.

The group will attend formal training courses and then attend the WC2006 event. There they will observe at close quarters the best armourers we have and they will do useful work under close supervision of experienced armourers.

They will experience the pressure of a world class event and see how the best armourers perform.

They will be involved in the event from setting up the venue, running the competition through to dismantling the facilities.

The event will also be used to examine and promote suitable Armourers to Master Armourers, the most senior qualification of the Guild Of Armourers.

Technical Skills

Armoury requires technical knowledge of how fencing and scoring equipment works.

Scoring is achieved by making an electric circuit between a weapon and the opponent but the environment for electric circuits is unusually hostile: lots of movement, sweat, wear and tear, connections working loose, wires breaking. The armourer therefore has to be aware of the modes of failure and must have a systematic approach to determine which of the many components involved has failed.

The armourer then has to be able to dismantle equipment, replace the damaged part and rebuild under significant time pressure.

The issue is further complicated at an international level as:

- a) there are several different designs of equipment in use by different countries
- b) air travel adversely affects equipment so there is an exceptionally high level of repair activity as equipment is presented for inspection.

Management Skills

Weapon Control is a management skill rather than a technical skill.

Control at international competitions is designed to ensure that equipment used by competitors is of a consistent and legal standard. There are a number of checks that are prescribed for each item of equipment.

The management skill is to ensure that large amounts of equipment (up to 12 items per competitor) are collected, inspected and returned to competitors in a short window of time for the competition to start. Teams of 10-20 armourers are involved in a major event managed by a Weapon Control Manager.

It is proposed to give Candidate Armourers access to the design documents describing Weapon Control, to observe Weapon Control in action and to be able to question the best weapon control managers available in the UK.
